

961 Is Omicron What We've Been Hoping For?

What if, right around Christmas, the Governor of Guam could give everybody a present, announcing that the pandemic was over? What if? Let's talk about this, next on The Extra Point.

Monday, I offered comments from a trio of doctors and researchers, who had started to discuss the omicron variant. Not much was known, but there was speculation that the virus was more transmissible than delta, would possibly evade some of the protection offered by vaccines and monoclonal treatments, and may or may not make people as sick or sicker than other variants.

There was also a positive note, that if omicron was actually milder than other variants, seeing is spread could actually be a good thing. Now, three days later, we know more.

I was watching the latest report from Dr. John Campbell of England, who has been covering the pandemic since it started. Omicron has indeed shown itself to spread more easily. There is virtually 100% agreement on this among scientists.

Campbell said that there is almost a certainty that omicron will evade some of the protection offered by vaccines, and also natural immunity. Those who rely upon vaccines and natural immunity will be more vulnerable to this new variant.

So far, there is zero evidence that omicron is making people sicker. In fact, all reports to this point are that symptoms are extremely mild, such as headaches and some muscle discomfort among the vaccinated. There is no information on omicron and its impact on the unvaccinated, but there is speculation that it will also be mild.

Campbell and others suggest that the transmissibility of this variant means that it's likely most people are going to be exposed to

it — the vaxxed and unvaxxed. As of yesterday, there were no reported cases of the omicron variant in the U.S. It won't stay that way for long, and Campbell believes we'll see a lot of them popping up within days.

If omicron can evade protection from the vaccines, what about a specific booster for it? Moderna says it will not have one until sometime in 2022. If it is able to get around the vaccine and turns out to be bad news, then that's a big problem. However, Campbell sees it another way...a positive way.

Using information from a German clinical epidemiologist, Campbell made the case that a virus can't be good at everything. It might be good at transmissibility, or evading immune protections, or making you sick. In the case of omicron, it appears it has used up all of its mutations on transmissibility, and maybe some on evading protection, but has nothing left to induce severe sickness. While nobody is exactly sure on this at present, Campbell believes this is the case, and he is joined by others in the scientific community.

His speculation is that omicron is certain to replace delta as the dominant variant in the world, giving everyone really mild disease, making the whole world's population immune and getting rid of the pandemic. COVID-19 would end, much like the Spanish Flu, common cold, and other coronaviruses that we live with today.

Campbell believes we'll have that answer in three weeks, once omicron spreads like a wildfire across the globe. Three weeks.

After what we've all been through with COVID, it seems too simple. He's very conservative in his presentations, and thorough in gathering information.
