

So, here's this guy who sold me his product, and he can't make the software work. The EBay shipping app wouldn't print his label. Then he asks me if it would be okay to send it via FedEx. That would triple or quadruple the shipping charge and before I could respond, he came back with, "Never mind, FedEx won't print my label either."

I was able to reach the Barrigada post office, and got some assistance. The guy was still at it, trying to make it work. Finally, after two-anda half hours, he was able to print the label and send it out via the postal service. I thought to myself, he could have easily thrown in the towel, cancelled the transaction, and sold it to someone else. He didn't. He stayed with it, and wanted me to have it.

Speaking of the Barrigada post office, I was there two days ago. I stood in the line inside the main area, and while waiting my turn the thought came to me that I've been going there for nearly 30 years. The faces at the counter are people I've been visiting for 5, 10, 15 years, and one who I believe was there when I first rented my P.O. box.

It's a great post office. The people are superefficient, and they do their job well, with a helpful attitude. I've lived elsewhere and I've traveled, and I've visited a fair number of post offices. None come close to Barrigada.

Facebook also reminded me of a bunch of people I've known for a long time. Post after post came through my newsfeed, either from people I haven't seen in a while, or it featured comments from them. It got me to thinking.

I've been blessed to know a lot of people for a long time. We don't always stay in touch, but when we do it's like I saw them yesterday. You know what I know, it's a special part of living in Guam.
